# Our History

The Alutiiq are the Kodiak Archipelago's first settlers, an Alaska Native people who came to the islands more than 7,500 years ago. We are closely related to the Native societies of the Bering Sea coast and the Aleutian Islands. Like our neighbors, we make our living harvesting from the land and sea.

Today about 1,800 of our people live in six coastal villages and the City of Kodiak. Many others live in neighboring Alaskan towns, in Anchorage, Seattle, and cities around the world.

Our tribal museum, the Alutiiq Museum, opened in 1995 to preserve and share our story, revitalize traditions, and invite all people to celebrate our culture.
