Objectives and Assessment Criteria:

Students will learn...

• The Alutiig names for the different animals.

Cultural Relevance:

According to Alutiiq lore, Kas'arpak, a powerful being who resided in the third of five sky worlds, created all the animals and birds in the universe. He formed the earth's creatures from a little man, giving them the ability to shift between animal and human form and endowing each with a soul. Although everything in the Alutiiq universe is believed to have a sua—a person inside that gives it consciousness—only humans and animals are thought to have souls. When an animal dies, its sua dies as well. However, if the animal is properly treated, its soul survives and can be reincarnated in another animal. As such, respectful human action is critical to

regeneration of game. The Chugach Alutiiq people of Prince William Sound believed that an animal's soul rested in a particular part of its body and hunters had to be careful to release this part to the environment. Honoring the animal's inner person, or sua, was also an important part of regeneration. Many of the masked dances performed at winter festivals were dedicated to this task. The unguwallriat were cared for by two powerful female beings. Imam Sua, who lived at the bottom of the ocean, ruled over marine creatures. Hunters asked her to provide them with game and for protection from the wind and waves when they were caught in a storm. Nunam Sua, the ruler of creatures that lived on the land, lived in mountain forests. She wore a knee-length coat covered with small animals and was surrounded by a bright light that made her difficult to see. Some people believed that she could read hunters' thoughts.

Create:

- Give each child a bingo card and chips. Randomly select the animals by using the cards in Alutiiq. Use the PowerPoint with the Alutiiq names for pronunciation or the Alutiiq Museum Word of the Week Archive.
- The first child to get four animals in a row wins. Once the child has called out bingo, have them recite the animal names in Alutiiq of the four that are in a row.
- Continue playing bingo by selecting different ways for the students to win using the bingo cards.

Close and Assessment:

- Have the students name at least one animal in Alutiiq.
- Have the students tell you in English or Alutiiq an animal that is found in Kodiak.

Modifications:

- Play the PowerPoint pronunciations in Alutiiq and have the students guess what animal it is English.
- As you say/play the Alutiiq names of animals, hold up the beanie baby animals to help students learn the word associated with the animal.

- How to identify the Alutiiq animal name and sing the songs in the Alutiiq language.
- Using music to help with assimilation, the students will be able to learn the names of the animals in relation to the song being sung about the animal.
- We encourage you to listen and sing the song a few times with the students to help encourage confidence and memorization.



Objectives and Assessment Criteria:

- Students will be able to identify common body parts in the Alutiiq language.
- Students will learn how to say the different parts of the body through a sona in Alutiia.

Cultural Relevance:

In traditional Alutiiq society, the different parts of the body had important roles in day-to-day activities. Sight, sound, smell, taste, and touch help people navigate both the human and spirit worlds. Hearing is particularly important, as sounds can be both helpful and dangerous. Hearing the sounds around you can help protect yourself from danger. Eyes were associated with age, knowledge, and power, particularly supernatural power. It was rude for young people to make direct eye contact, and downcast eyes are a symbol of respect and humility. Using their mouths to communicate with one another and whistling to communicate with the spirit world. Prehistoric Alutiiq skeletal remains indicate that men worked extensively with their arms. Bones and muscles thicken with strenuous physical activity, and larger muscles etch a larger pattern on the underlying bone. From looking at the marks left by

muscles on adult male arm bones, particularly the humerus or upper arm bone, anthropologists believe that Alutiiq men developed massive arm muscles. This strength reflects a lifetime of carrying wood and water, building structures, throwing spears, casting darts, and paddling boats.

Create:

- 1. Share the PowerPoint with students. Have them listen to the pronunciation of the words and repeat the words with them.
- 2. Give the students the Alutiiq Lyrics to a chant, similar to "Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes" by Sophie Katelnikoff Shepard and Susie Malutin, with the Alutiq Language Club. Song lyrics:

Teach the students the following lyrics:

Nasquq, tuik*, cisquk, anengquyut** Head, shoulders, knees, and toes.

Cisquk, anengquyut. Knees and toes. Knees and toes.

Cisquk, anengquyut. Nasquq, tuik*, cisquk, anengquyut***. Head, shoulders, knees, and toes. lingalak, cuutek, ganeg, cali gengag. Eyes, ears, mouth, and nose.

* Alternative Southern pronunciation of "shoulder" — "tusek; tuwik" ** Alternative Southern word for "toes "— "putukut"

- 3. Play the song in Alutiiq for the pronunciation: http://www.alutiiqlanguage.org/songs
- 4. Give the students the Qaik Body Worksheet to fill out. Say the words in Alutiig and English with the students.

• nasqua — head

tuik — shoulders (2)

cisauk — knees (2)

anengquyut — toes (3+)

iingalak — eyes (2)

cuutek — ears (2)

• ganeq — mouth

gengaq — nose

Modification:

Introduce the body tracing activity to the students. Have the students get into pairs and lay a large piece of paper on the floor. Have the students lay down on that paper traces each other. Once they have traced each other have the students label the body parts in Alutiiq together.

Close and Assessment:

- The students completed the Qaik body worksheet.
- The students understand the parts of the body in Alutiig.
