First Friday with Mariah Stapleton

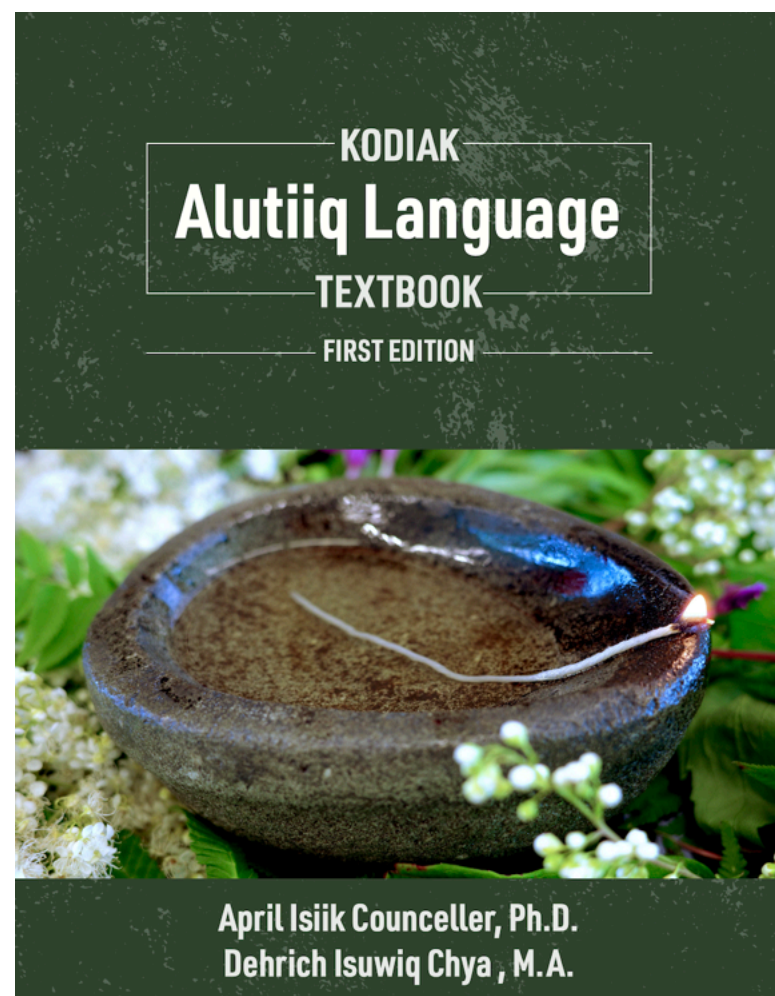
