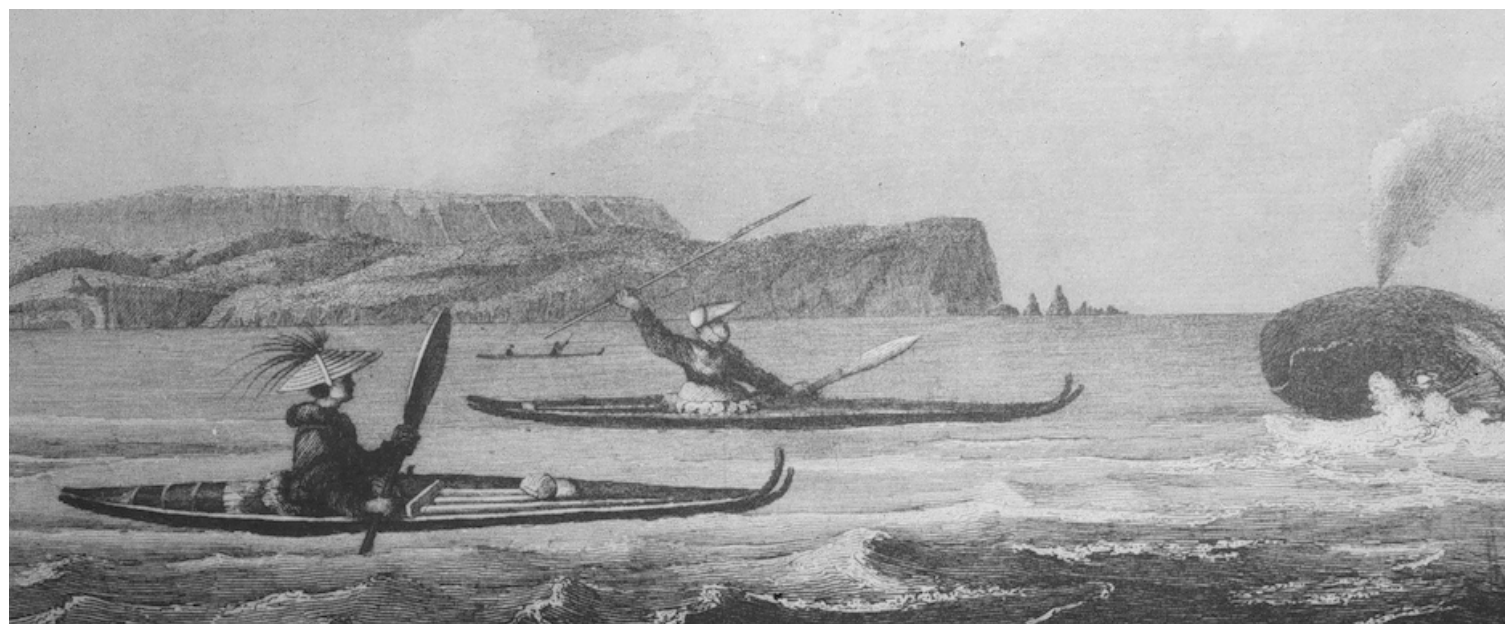
Searchable Lessons
