Historic baskets, a fox bone necklace, Elders' spruce roots hats, an ancestral stone sculpture, and both historic and contemporary masks are among the items kindly entrusted to our care. We are grateful. We will use them to tell Alutiiq stories. Some will be shown in our new exhibit hall next May. While you wait for the debut of our displays, you can see one recent addition at our November First Friday event—a 19th century mask. There are still many ways to engage with the museum during the final months of our renovation.

A wooden mask collected in Kodiak in the 19th century was transferred to the Alutiiq Museum recently by McMaster University. This history of this unique piece is unknown, but it resembles a mask found in Karluk. See the mask at our First Friday event or in the Amutat Database on our website.
