Archaeology in Eagle Harbor

In May, Alutiiq Museum archaeologists conducted fieldwork as part of our National Park Service-funded grant "Remembering Eagle Harbor." The fieldwork included a full documentation of the Russian and American Period historical village site Iraq or Eagle Harbor, located on the south side of Ugak Bay. During fieldwork, museum archaeologists took photographs, videos, high-resolution drone imagery, and high-accuracy GPS data of the site to document the current conditions and historical extent of the village. Over 100 house remains were documented and the fieldwork revealed two older house pits showing that the Alutiiq connection to Eagle Harbor extends earlier than previously known.
